- 7. The characterizations of the status-hungry Mrs. Binat and Mr. Farhat Kaleen are broad rather than subtle.
- 8. Darsee and Alys talk about finding home and identity having grown up in multiple places, with one foot in Pakistani culture and traditions and the other foot trying to adapt to more western sensibilities.
- 9. Are there any scenes or quotes that stood out to you?
- 10. If you could hear this same story from another person's point of view, who would you choose?
- 11. Did you race to the end, or was it more of a slow burn?
- 12. We got to see everyone's future in the epilogue. Did these outcomes ring true?
